

The objective of the Amachi program is to disrupt the cycle of incarceration. Research shows that - without intervention -70% of children with a parent in prison will end up serving time too. Mentorship can interrupt this painful cycle.

The Amachi mentorship program pairs children with adult mentors to listen, laugh, and learn together. The program emphasizes the believe in nurturing each child's unique talents and meeting their needs.

Amachi is a West African word meaning "Who knows but what God has brought us through this child."
